PMF 2005



Pacific Music Festival marked its 16th season in 2005 with 127 PMF Academy members from 24 countries and regions and faculty members from the Vienna and Berlin philharmonics, and major orchestras from the USA. The festival attracted audiences totaling 46,874 during its duration. In

total, 44 concerts and performances were held in Sapporo and other cities including ensemble concerts and open rehearsals at EXPO 2005 Aichi Japan, the first global exposition of the 21st Century. These performances reflected the exhibition's theme, "Grand Intercultural Symphony." Principal Conductor Nello Santi featured Italian composers Rossini and Respighi. He instructed the orchestra by singing cheerfully and rhythmically to explain the composers' concepts. Guest Conductor, Jun Märkl led the orchestra in the Japanese première of the festival's Composer-in-Residence

Detlev Glanert's symphony, Katafalk. This season the new String Quartet Course was established. The Tokyo String Quartet coached young string quartets from the USA, Poland, and Japan. The PMF Alumni who contributed to the success of this season's festival were Daniel Matsukawa (Bassoon Faculty, '92/ '93/'94), Shinji Kawamoto (Artistic Administrator, Bassoon '90/'91), Kenny Chen (Orchestra Manager, Horn, '91), Takuya Takashima (Assistant Orchestra Manager, Oboe '03/'04) and Noriko Shibaki (PMF Organizing Committee, Piano '90).

Yoshi's Debut at Carnegie Hall

PMF 2004 Composition Course alumnus Yoshiaki Onishi had his debut at Carnegie Hall when Japanese pianist Yukiko Tanaka performed Yoshi's Antithèse (2005) for piano solo at her debut piano recital at Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall on December 18, 2005. This piece, written especially for Ms. Tanaka's debut recital, is Yoshi's most recent piece for piano and involves some extended piano techniques. Yoshi will be writing also for Lucerne Festival's 12-person percussion ensemble in which 2004-2005 PMF alumnus David Skidmore will participate. The ensemble will perform his work in Lucerne, Switzerland in early September, 2006.

The Leonard Bernstein Memorial Stage was opened in June 2004 at Sapporo Art Park and features more space, upgraded facilities, and improved acoustics than the previous temporary outdoor stage it replaced.

Double Bass (1990, 1991, 1999), Taiwan




